# A letter from the CEO

What I know about 2020 was that nothing was "as its always has been." It would be so easy to write this letter with the perspective that 2020 was the hardest year ever, and it was hard, but that would be doing it a great disservice. If there is one thing I learned in 2020, it was that there has to be a way for us to allow two counter-intuitive concepts to take up the same space. That while something can be difficult and awful, it can also be overwhelmingly amazing and inspiring. This annual report will demonstrate so many of the reasons I believe that to be true.

We saw an incredible increase in need this year. Our Valley Assistance Network averaged 1,600 incoming calls a month and over 220 new clients a month, a 150 percent increase over the previous year. Not a day went by that we weren't hit with the reality that so many ALICE families were struggling to get through this unprecedented health crisis.

Then there was you...YOU are the reason we have so much to be thankful for in 2020. In a year where we weren't sure we were going to be able to respond to any needs, YOU stepped up and made it happen. YOU donated to our COVID-19 Relief fund, YOU made United Way campaign gifts, YOU gave to the ALICE Emergency fund, YOU shopped our Rubbermaid sales, YOU volunteered, YOU reached out and helped, YOU spread the word. YOU, YOU, YOU. YOU made this 2020, this year that will go down in history.

I've never been prouder to work for an organization that has been able to mobilize so quickly and efficiently to respond to emergency needs in the way we have this year. When I look at the purpose of United Ways and our roles in communities all over this country, I think of 2020 and I think of how we were made for a time such as this. We will continue to be here, not just today, not just tomorrow, and not just through this crisis. Just as we have for 75 years, we will continue to be connected to this community so we can respond to the needs whatever they may be.



# VALLEY ASSISTANCE NETWORK

Every day, families in our community make tough choices - like deciding whether to pay for rent or food; or whether to buy medication or put gas in their car to get to work. More than 41% of our local population is at or below the ALICE (Asset limited, income constrained, employed) threshold, and struggles to make ends meet. That is where United Way NSV's Valley Assistance Network (VAN) steps in, to help families when they have nowhere else to turn.

# WE RESPOND TO REAL NEEDS, IN REAL TIME

VAN's mission is to engage community resources to move individuals and families from crisis to financial security. We provide immediate crisis intervention services to help ALICE families navigate the complex social services system and move from crisis to stability. Since 2017, we have helped over 3,800 families connect with shelter, clothing, food, medical care, job training and more.

VAN saw record growth in 2020, proving 3,500+ referrals to 2,228 households.





# **TYPES OF REFERRALS IN 2020**







United Way NSV has been working in partnership with community organizations and non-profits to assess the evolving needs of people in the communities we serve. We launched the COVID-19 Relief Fund to provide urgent and necessary funds for the emerging and critical needs within our community due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

Through this fund, United Way NSV has been able to provide nearly \$200,000 in support. Emergency financial assistance has been deployed to meet the needs of those experiencing a housing crises, in need of childcare with access to food, and supporting the overall health of our community. Funds have also been used to assist with utilities, medical and prescription needs, car repairs and insurance.


# **2020 COVID-19 RELIEF FUND GRANTS**

\$74,500	Housing assistance for help making payments for rent and mortgages as well as emergency hotel assistance
\$25,000	Food pantry assistance
\$23,000	Emergency financial assistance to assist with utilities, medical and prescription needs, car repairs and insurance, and child care
\$21,150	Childcare assistance, grants for summer programs, emergency school supplies and emergency baby supplies
\$6,000	Medication assistance due to an inability to pay due to job loss and reduced hours
\$5,000	Mobile feeding programs to bring food to heavily hit communities
\$2,500	Pet food and emergency vet bill support to pet owners who are in crisis
\$2,000	Emergency transportation assistance for those needing to get to work
\$500	Advocacy and education materials for eviction
\$500	Antibacterials and hand sanitizer for at-risk individuals

# CARES ACT GRANTS

Since the start of the pandemic, 28% of surveyed residents in the Northern Shenandoah Valley have said they were concerned they would miss a housing payment or were not confident they would make next month's payment, according to the COVID-19 Impact Survey. Through trusted partnerships with our local governments, United Way NSV distributed \$655,00 in CARES Act Funding to help families who lost income due to COVID-19.

Through the CARES program, UWNSV and our partner agencies:

- Prevented 289 evictions and foreclosures
- Restored or saved 524
   utilities from disconnection

Funds were given to United Way NSV to be used to help pay utility bills, mortgage or rental expenses.

United Way NSV coordinated with area partners to provide this assistance, helping more than 1,000 people in Winchester City and Frederick County.

# **OUTCOME STATS:**

- 289 evictions and foreclosures prevented
- 524 utilities restored or saved from disconnection
- 329 unduplicated families received financial assistance
- Over 1,000 people impacted




